Character, Plot, Theme, and How They Do It



Characters

- **Protagonist:** the central character
 - caught in a conflict
 - must act
 - actions reveal character traits

■ Antagonist


- the villain
- often creates conflict situation


■ Alter Ego

- act as support, therapy, sounding board
- **Romanic Interest**
- **Fifth Business**
 - minor character who is a catalyst, allows plot to turn or be resolved









+ Plot

- Actions of the characters
- Usually grouped into scenes
 - parataxis: scenes presented in sequence, often without transitions
- Rising and falling actions: introducing characters, complications, turning point, climax, denouement

Theme

- Ideas
 - dramas present one or more perspectives or philosophical points of view on the human condition
 - e.g. The Nostos: the Journey Home
 - The Odyssey
 - e.g. The Bildungsroman: the Journey into Adulthood (Coming of Age)
 - Stand By Me
- Motif ...
 - a recurring pattern that points to a theme (image, music, etc.)



Writing a Movie

- Film begins with a script.
 - contains dialogue, actions, music, settings
 - can be original or rewritten from other sources
 - novels (short are best)
 - plays
 - other films
- Good films must start with a good script.



Acting in a Movie



- More intimate
 - close-ups: acting with the eyes, with slight gestures
 - more silence
 - greater range of volume in voice
- Greater demands of the modern audience for
 - authentic accents, gestures
 - physical ability e.g. stunts



Directing a Movie



- places and directs the actors in each scene
- collaborates with cinematographer on camera angles and lighting
- collaborates with producer to get locations, actors, equipment, etc. required for movie scenes
- collaborates with writers on the shooting script



Designing a Movie



Set for "High Plains Drifter"

- Set Design ...
 - sound stages to create complete environments
 - exterior sets grander, more expensive
 - any historical time period can be created with
 - costumes
 - architecture
 - vehicles
- Locations
 - movies can travel anywhere on Earth, set the action in real places

Editing a Movie

- Scene Sequencing
 - done after filming
 - can speed up or slow down a final cut
- Major Scenes
 - Longer
 - Establish main characters at beginning
 - Main events of plot
 - Turning point and climax scenes
- Minor scenes
 - Shorter
 - Scenes to advance plot
 - Scenes to show character
 - Transitional scenes



Scoring a Movie



- Music can ..
 - set a mood or theme from the beginning, identify the film in the audience's mind
 - signal a change in action, fast or slow pace of a scene
 - reinforce the mood or theme of a scene
 - identify specific characters
 - make transitions between plot elements
 - be original or borrowed
